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ANAPHYLAXIS PROTOCOL

At **Camp Robin Hood (CRH)**, we are committed to ensuring that all campers and staff with **anaphylactic allergies** can safely participate in our camp environment. Please review this policy and discuss it with your camper so we can work together to maintain a **safe & inclusive** experience for everyone.

A. Nut & Allergy Aware Camp

We aim to be a "**nut aware**" camp, though we acknowledge that we cannot eliminate all risks as we cannot be sure of 100% compliance by every participant, despite best efforts by everyone.

- We educate families about allergies in our camp literature and throughout the summer.
- Families are encouraged to **read labels carefully** and only send nut-free food and personal care items.
- We work closely with suppliers to research and serve nut-aware products at camp.
- Our **food ingredient list** will be posted on our website before the start of camp.
- We maintain a strict No Food Sharing policy to prevent cross-contact.
- Staff actively supervise all meals and snacks.
- If a **nut product is sent to camp**, it will be packed away, and families will be contacted with a reminder of our policy.
- If food containing **other known allergens** is sent, the camper will sit beside peers without the allergy and **wash hands after eating**.

B. Epinephrine Auto-Injectors (EAI)

Campers with anaphylactic allergies must have at least two (2) EAIs at camp:

- 1. The first EAI must be carried by the camper in a CRH fanny pack or personal carrying case.
- 2. The second EAI ('the spare') should be:
 - Given to the bus counselor or staff at drop-off on the camper's first day.
 - Stored in Robin Aid, our camp Health Centre, for emergency use.

*All EAIs must: have the original pharmacy label attached and have an expiry date beyond the camp session.



C. Fanny Pack or Carrying Case

All campers with anaphylaxis **must** carry their own EAI(s) in a CRH fanny pack or a personal carrying case **at all times**. **Fanny Pack Options**:

- If using a CRH fanny pack, indicate this on the dietary form. On your camper's first day, please send your camper with their EAI in the front pocket of their backpack and the unit head will transfer the camper's EAI into a new CRH fanny pack.
- If using a **personal carrying case**, ensure the camper **wears it upon arrival to camp**.

A name tag will be attached to the fanny pack on Day 1—please keep it on for easy identification in emergencies.

D. Anaphylactic Alert Posters

Each camper with an anaphylaxis allergy must have a completed **Anaphylactic Alert Poster**. Prior to the summer, this poster is e-mailed out to families. We ask that caregivers complete the poster with a photo of the camper and upload it to the registration portal or by sending it via e-mail to <u>health@camprobinhood.ca</u>.

E. Allergy Safety During Camp Activities

Swim & Canoe

- EAIs will be hung on a designated hook during water activities.
- Campers and counselors are responsible for ensuring the EAI is placed and retrieved.

Snacks, Cooking & Crafts

- Complete the **Dietary Form** (in the Registration Portal) as early as possible so we can plan accordingly.
- Camp provides daily snacks, juice, Friday pizza, and occasional special snacks.
- Ingredient lists will be posted HERE and on our website.
- If your camper is allergic to specific foods, the **Division Head will contact you before camp** to discuss substitutes.
 - If sending allergy-safe food as substitutes, we ask that you: Clearly label all food with: Camper's first & last name, Unit name and When the food is needed (e.g., "For s'mores night"). Food should be handed to the bus counselor or staff at drop-off.
- Known allergens (e.g., acorns, eggshells, nuts) will not be used in crafts.



F. Bus Procedures

🚍 Bus Riders:

- Campers must wear their EAI fanny pack before boarding.
- Bus counselors will check for EAIs before departure.
- If the camper forgets their EAI, the spare will be used, and families will be notified.

Driving to Camp:

• At drop-off, show staff the EAI in the fanny pack/case. If forgotten, the spare will be used.

G. Lost or Misplaced EAI

- If an EAI is misplaced, staff will search immediately.
- If not found quickly, the **spare EAI will be used**, and families will be contacted.

H. Medication Policy

Only EAIs, asthma puffers & Lactaid pills may be carried by campers. All other medications must be:

- Accompanied by the Sending Medication to Camp form (access HERE).
- Prescription meds must be in the original pharmacy bottle with a label attached.
- Over-the-counter meds must be in the original packaging.
- Handed to the bus counselor or staff at drop-off for direct delivery to Robin Aid.

I. Benadryl & Antihistamines

- We do not use Benadryl® or similar antihistamines to treat anaphylaxis.
- In case of an allergic reaction, we will administer epinephrine immediately.
- Newer antihistamines (Reactine®, Claritin®, Aerius®) may be used after epinephrine to relieve symptoms like hives.

J. Communication with Families

- **Before each session**, allergy information letters will be emailed to families whose camper(s) share a cabin or bus with a child with an anaphylactic allergy.
- These letters will indicate the types of allergies present (without identifying specific campers).
